The mission of Vallejo Teaching Artists is to provide safe and supportive spaces for the youth of Vallejo to develop and share their artistic craft, to express their creative voice with confidence, and to influence the landscape of social justice. We value its purpose for the important impact youth have on humanity. We are committed to empowering youth to create artistic works that represent, honor and celebrate the diversity of our social and cultural differences. We are dedicated to building visual and performance literacy that supports academic, social and emotional learning toward reaching individual potential.

### **Our Vision**

Vallejo Teaching Artists envision equitable art spaces that support, guide, and advocate for youth artistic expression and growth. We encourage youth to be socially responsible by building empathy, empowerment and perseverance. We create high-quality, meaningful curricula that integrate creative practice with standard-based content. We thoughtfully collaborate with educators to help facilitate student access to educational outcomes and academic standards, using the arts as a medium. We believe that the arts should be embraced as essential to the holistic development of each person.

### **Our Goals**

Empowering youth to share their stories and express their beliefs freely, and with powerful effectiveness, through music, dance, visual arts, theater and new media to authentic audiences of their peers, their families and community members.

Facilitating Arts-centered integration that improves student engagement, comprehension, and performance across subject areas.

Creating youth-based spaces for the Performing and Visual Arts, i.e. an art gallery, dance studios, and theaters.

Offering school site performances from Bay Area artists & arts organizations.

Developing the VTA Internship Program – a program for professional artists who aspire to be a teaching artist by providing professional development that connects the skills of their art forms with effective engagement in their teaching.

Building positive partnerships with arts organizations both locally and globally.

Continuing and developing the VTA Summer Studio – a program that creates an opportunity for students to immerse themselves in their artistic practice and craft.

Promoting Public Visual and Performance art opportunities for students to exhibit their work to our local community and beyond, promoting discovery, discourse, and mutual understanding.



### Message From The Board

In 2009, a group of Vallejo parents prioritized and raised funds for local artists to provide their children at the Vallejo Charter School with a strong Visual and Performing Arts program, one that enhanced and expanded their child's academic experience. For the past twelve years, the artists have worked tirelessly to build on that vision and to expand it in hope of ensuring that every child in Vallejo receives equal access to the Arts. In 2019, this vision created the non-profit Vallejo Teaching Artists, Incorporated.

Last school year, 2021-22, was the students' return-to-school experience after the pandemic. Artists supported students with activities for socialization and engagement in social justice studies. We significantly expanded the content of the Youth Arts Magazine, which, after its first edition, was sought after by our community, vendors, and schools. Students celebrated their successes at the Vallejo Open Studios. We added a book club on social justice issues and created a mural at Vallejo Charter School that shows us as one "crew". Students asked the question who is really driving our current reality in their sketch "Animal Takeover". Students created their own songs about their experiences of returning to society after being isolated. They also collaborated in teams to create theme-based music videos where they wrote the script or brought the contents of a book in their unique way.

We celebrate with students and teachers our gratitude of being and learning together again. It takes an education village, the teaching artists, classroom teachers, VCUSD school staff and administrators, funders, parents, and, of course, our students to create real learning and a future for our children. Inside this, our second Annual Report, you will get an opportunity to learn

more about us and our accomplishments this past year.

We are Vallejo Teaching Artists and together we can make a real difference.

as findings support in a Rice University study, "students' arts learning experiences significantly improve educational outcomes. Fostering and supporting these experiences lead to improvements in student discipline, writing achievement, and compassion for others." <sup>2</sup>

As VTA art instructors, we see the positive impacts in working with teachers to weave the arts into core classroom curricula and observe up close the benefits that the arts hold in helping students gain a greater understanding of difficult concepts through visual representation.

Improving access to arts education is also an equity issue for Vallejo students. California Alliance for Arts Education reports, "Disadvantaged and at-risk youth are often barred from school arts programs in favor of remedial instruction in reading and math. This practice contradicts research evidence that quality arts education provides even greater learning benefits to disadvantaged youth than their advantaged classmates." 3

#### Diversity & Inclusion Book Club is a




supportive space for student to share their ideas, perspectives, and point-of-view by unpacking and witnessing student truths through lively discussion groups and through the arts.


**Music Recording Program** introduces students to the music recording industry as musicians, songwriters, and producers. Our recording studio is managed by youth artists.
